In 2021-22, City Year Jacksonville AmeriCorps members served 11 Duval County public schools, reaching more than 2,100 elementary, middle and high school students.

Despite closing out the 2019-2020 pandemic year, students still felt its lingering impacts, including an unprecedented teacher shortage in Duval County.

Our AmeriCorps members remained dedicated to serving Jacksonville classrooms and communities – working alongside teachers and students to ensure a continuity of learning, mentorship and emotional support. We work with students in four core areas to achieve these goals: Attendance; Soft Skills Development; Math; English Language Arts/Literacy. And for every student, every day, in every classroom we serve, our team provided a caring presence and a welcome smile.

Our AmeriCorps members develop and implement a wide variety of events and initiatives to create a school culture in which students feel safe, encouraged and applauded.

- Student appreciation events celebrating positive behavior
- Celebratory events such as Black History Month to recognize achievements in our students' culture
- Little library programs and free book fairs highlighting books with characters that look like our students
- ELA and Math events that celebrate student progress in learning and preparing for standardized tests

MEET MCKENZIE

McKenzie joined City Year Jacksonville as an AmeriCorps member to make a difference. She is currently serving at Susie E. Tolbert Elementary, and shares her "starfish" story.

III A starfish story shares the impact made by City Year on the lives of our students. The idea comes from the parable of a little girl who finds millions of starfish washed onto a beach and begins to toss them back into the ocean, one by one. While she may not be able to save every one of them, she makes a difference to each one she tosses.

Hi, my name is McKenzie.

While serving alongside City Year Jacksonville's AmeriCorps members, I met an amazing student who was just simply being misunderstood.

John*, my student, is the youngest of five siblings – and unfortunately, never received the dedicated attention he needed from his busy home life. That led to John's choices at school reflecting his desire to get the attention he craved, whether that was positive or negative.

When I started working in John's classroom, I always wondered about John's "why" – why did he feel the need to behave or act in a certain way that didn't encompass all the potential he truly had inside.

One day, I approached John and asked him simply what I could do personally to help him make better decisions.

Immediately, John lit up. His first question: "Ms. McKenzie, you just asked how you can help me?"

I replied, "Yes, as your City Year mentor, I'm here to help and support you." And what he told me broke my heart.

He said he's never had anyone ask him how they can help him. John felt ignored. Because of that, he often turned to negative actions just to be seen.

That day opened my eyes. I realized everyone has a story – and there's always a reason someone might choose to behave a certain way or take a certain action.

In order for me to support John, I first had to understand his point of view. I had to learn John's story.
