DID YOU KNOW? A student is considered "high needs" if they belong to any of the following groups:

- Students with Disabilities: Students who have an Individualized Education Program (IEP)
- English Language Learners: Students whose home language is not English.
- <u>Economically Disadvantaged</u>: Students who meet one or more of these conditions:
 - o Participate in state-administered programs like SNAP, foster care, or MassHealth
 - Are certified as "Low Income" through a supplemental data collection process
 - Are reported as homeless by the school district

CLASSROOM IMPACT

To focus our impact where it's needed most, we work with our school partners to identify students in greatest need of support from City Year Greater Boston AmeriCorps members. This data illustrates our AmeriCorps members' impact on students they worked with one-on-one throughout the year.

MEETING GROWTH GOALS:

Students are increasing their course grade by at least one letter grade and/or meeting expected growth targets on their Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) and i-Ready assessments.

OFF TRACK:

Students are starting the school year with a grade of C- or lower in their coursework, based on the earliest available grade (most often their final grade from the prior school year).

BRAG BOX

City Year Greater Boston surveys school administrators and partner teachers anonymously at the beginning, middle, and end of the school year. These surveys allow us to gather real-time feedback about our impact, ensure open channels of communication with our closest partners, and help us identify wins and challenges in the moment. TEACHING FELLOWSHIP

City Year's Teaching Fellowship program transforms a year of service into a classroom career. In partnership with UMass Boston, City Year Greater Boston offers an affordable pathway for AmeriCorps members to earn their graduate degree and teaching license. Teaching Fellows serve full-time in schools under a mentor teacher and earn academic credit for their fellowship while accessing lowered tuition costs at UMass Boston. Teaching Fellows also receive priority support for job placement in Boston Public Schools after graduation. Since 2020, this pipeline-strengthening program has cleared the way for dozens of aspiring educators to earn their degrees in education, helped address ongoing teacher shortages, and infused schools with passionate and service-driven leaders.

BRENDA'S PASSION

"My entire life I have had one goal: to enter the field of criminology. My concentration was always focused on how adults operate within, because of, and in spite of the criminal justice system. Then I joined City Year.

My students have undeniably changed me, my goals, and my hopes and desires. I feel their joys and sorrows deep in my heart. This held true every time they demanded, not asked, that I attend their lacrosse match. This held true every time they rushed to my defense against any perceived slight, even when I had to coach them on their use of inappropriate language.

It is because of them I have decided to pursue a career which will allow me to work with kids in the criminal justice system, to be their advocate and mentor. To me, there is no greater honor.

Last year, I had the chance to speak to the courts on behalf of one of my students. I wrote about the work they had done with me to create bulletin boards and make up missing assignments as a form of reparation. I shared what a good friend and teammate they were, and how hard they worked to hold themselves together despite the hardships they faced.

I will never stop advocating because I believe, as I told the courts, they should be allowed to continue to learn and make mistakes with the same grace granted to any other teenager. The truth is, they've had a bigger impact on me than I have on them. They are the reason I serve."
