#### WHAT WE DO

In partnership with teachers and schools, diverse teams of AmeriCorps members cultivate learning environments where students can build on their strengths, fully engage in their learning and experience success.

Founded in Boston, Mass. in 1988, City Year is now in 29 U.S. cities and two international affiliates, and in over 300 schools with 3,000 AmeriCorps members serving 226,000 students. City Year has served San Antonio for 28 years and for 26 of those years, we have been partnered with the San Antonio Independent School District. Since 2011, we have served over 90,000 students using our Whole School Whole Child Model and have had 900+ Americorps members serve in this great city!

Our AmeriCorps members serve in schools as student success coaches who help students cultivate foundational social, emotional and academic skills. They not only make a difference in the lives of students, but also acquire valuable skills and experience that prepare them to lead and make meaningful contributions where they live and work.

#### **HOW CITY YEAR WORKS IN SCHOOLS**

City Year works closely with the school principal and teachers to deliver a suite of interconnected services that cost-effectively and efficiently improve student, classroom and whole school outcomes.



One-on-one and small group instruction in English and math with embedded social-emotional supports



Use of data to monitor student progress and better meet student needs



Additional capacity in the classroom, supporting classroom routines and providing and enabling differentiated instruction



Afterschool programming, homework assistance, enrichment curricula and civic projects that build and serve community



Small group social-emotional skill building sessions



Whole school activities that improve conditions for learning, engage families and inspire civic engagement





# POSITIVE IMPACT ON STUDENTS IN THE CLASSROOM

- Half of students given 1-1 suppport demonstrated growth in MAP/grades
- 89% of teachers agree that AmeriCorps members had a positive impact on students' academic growth in Math and ELA.

**2x more likely** to improve on state English assessments




**Up to 3x more likely** to improve proficiency rates in math



# **FOCUS LIST STUDENTS**

Each AmeriCorps member is paired with a partner teacher to offer whole classroom support to the entire class. Our AmeriCorps members give targeted 1-1 and/or small group support to focus list students using our Whole School Whole Child program model through targeted interventions that are recorded in our data system.

In 2015 my brother Charlie Nuñez participated in this organization, and I remember every community service event he brought me to. I saw the positive impact that those red jackets had on the community. I remember how powerful and contagious the energy was in that environment and that has stuck with me to this day.


As I grew older, my foundation consisted of serving my community and helping others, but life doesn't always go as planned. As I was ready to take the next steps in college, I forgot what brought me there. I lost who I was as a person and I struggled with no sense of direction. After my second year, I decided to go back to what made me feel like I had a purpose. Through the grace of God, it was my time to serve. It was my turn to put on the red jacket and give back what this organization had given to me six years prior.

I wanted to have the same impact my brother had on me. I had someone to guide me and lead me in the right direction. I had someone to allow me to fall in order to understand why and learn from my mistakes and at my darkest times he was there to help me when I needed him most. When I struggled in school, he would be patient with me and help me no matter how long it took. When I would get in trouble, he wouldn't yell at me but talk to me to allow me to understand what I did wrong. When I was close to quitting, he would always push me to never give up and even when I didn't believe in myself, he believed in me the most. He is my coach, my mentor, my City Year, and my brother. I thank God every day because I wouldn't be here without his support. That's the kind of impact I want for my students. I want them to know that they have someone in their corner who believes in them because all it takes is one person to make a change in someone's life. One person to inspire, to change the mindset and expectations of young students to encourage, and open their minds to more possibilities to prepare them for that moment in their life where they can make better happen.


