FOCUS LIST STUDENTS

Each AmeriCorps member is paired with a partner teacher to offer whole classroom support to the entire class. Our AmeriCorps members give targeted 1-1 and/or small group support to focus list students using our Whole School Whole Child program model through targeted interventions that are recorded in our data system.

Sam Houston High School | 2023-24

My name is Jackson Gemborys and I proudly served on the City Year AmeriCorps team at Sam Houston High School for the 2023-24 school year.

I hail from the great city of Durham, North Carolina. I attended Greensboro College where I majored in Acting. I would not be here today, in front of you all, if it were not for my mom.

Growing up, my mom put a huge emphasis on our education. I remember coming home on the bus and wanting badly to go outside and play football with all my friends. But once my mom got home, which was right after me, it was homework time. She would sit with me for hours, sometimes all the way until midnight, helping me with my assignments.

I remember my teachers used to assign us 30 minutes of independent reading every night. It was sort of an honor code assignment. The teacher would never know if you did it or not, you could lie to them and just say that you did it. My Mom, however, would always sit with me and read. We would go sentence by sentence together reading all kinds of books: The Boy in the Striped Pajamas, The Color of Water, The Book Thief, Where The Red Fern Grows, and many others. This lasted until I was a junior in high school. Not only did she read with me every night, but she also was my first acting coach. In high school, I acted in 12 shows and for each show my mom helped me learn my lines. We would run the entire show 2-3 times, going over lines, saying them in funny voices, and just having a blast.

I did not fully appreciate my mom doing this for me until I was off to college. My mom instilled a deep sense of understanding and empathy in me. She taught me the value of imagination and curiosity. The importance of asking questions and the ability to make reading fun.

What my mom did for me, I want to be able to do for my students. I want to be there for them, and work with them every day. I want to instill in them that reading can broaden your mind and help shape you into the person you want to become.

Today I aspire to become a high school theatre teacher. Without my mom's dedication to my education, her sacrifice of her own time, and her loving nature I would not be who I am today.


Dr. Jefferson understands the challenges associated with achieving long-term, sustainable results while building


